Field Notes: WORCESTER COUNTY BIRDS: 2015

As this year began, the weather by February alternated between report-breaking snow falls and bone-chilling temperatures. Snow was measured in many feet and you didn't know where you were going to put the next shovel-full because it was piling up higher than your head. Roofs collapsed and gutters fell. There hasn't been a more challenging time to bird in central Massachusetts. Snow continued well into March, but normal temperatures finally returned in April, though dirty, icy snow piles remained in parking lots well into spring. Finally, by summer we had average temperatures, though below average rainfall. Fall was mild and warm and this continued into December with warmer than typical temperatures and little precipitation.

Birders tallied a respectable 244 species seen in the County for 2015. This included a new County species: a Crested Caracara noted from Dexter Drumlin, and unfortunately a "one day wonder". Decades ago, this sighting would have likely been dismissed as an "escape", but in recent years this uncommon and local Florida and Gulf Coast species has been found to very rarely wander well north of its range.

Other noteworthy birds seen in the County in 2015 included the 6th County report of Leach's Storm-Petrel. As usual, this was a storm driven waif, seen by many flying around and then eventually resting, likely exhausted, on West Waushacum. Leach's Storm-Petrels are a tough bird to tick even coastally in Massachusetts. The common storm-petrel, seen from shore and during whale watch trips, is Wilson's Storm-Petrels. They can be abundant in state off shore waters. But you need to get well offshore to see Leach's, like to Hydrographer's Canyon, which requires an over-night boat trip. Leach's Storm-Petrels do breed in state waters while Wilson's do not. Some Leach's breed on the Penikese Islands, where they make their nests in holes in the ground or old foundations or walls. But here's the weird thing: even though Wilson's are abundant off-shore in the state, the storm-petrel noted inland after hurricanes and other severe weather are all Leach's! So if you are fortunate to see a storm-petrel in the County, assume first that it is a Leach's, BUT obviously check it out carefully just in case it could be some other species. My last Leach's in the County was on 8-20-91 on Wachusett Reservoir, seen just as a hurricane was winding down.

Another County rarity noted was a Mississippi Kite, the 4th report for the County. This species is expanding its range in a number of areas, and is to be looked for in spring and early summer. A Purple Gallinule was found at Little Chauncy Pond in October and enjoyed by many. This was only the third County record of this species.

There was a modest flight of winter finches, mostly redpolls and siskin. Flocks of Bohemian Waxwings were found only very locally in north County.

Shorebird activity in the County is dependent on numerous factors. Key among them are well flooded fields in spring and low water at ponds and reservoirs by late summer. Inland birders have to be the only group of people who actually appreciate a modest drought in summer. Low water at Quaboag Pond and other sites meant there were muddy edges present and that meant

shorebirds. One of the most interesting shorebird finds this year was a Stilt Sandpiper, a very uncommon to rare County bird. If conditions are right, the active County birder has as good or better chance of seeing coveted "grass-pipers" like Baird's or Buff-breasted Sandpipers inland than at the usual coastal shorebird locations.

Other highlights of the year included a Short-eared Owl, Hooded Warbler, Yellow-breasted Chat and Clay-colored Sparrow.

It is interesting to note certain species that several decades back would have been considered very rare, but now are becoming of a yearly occurrence. Barrow's Goldeneye is one such species. When I began birding, I thought I would have to head to the coast to see this primarily northwestern migrant. But as recent observations have proven, Barrow's seem to be a yearly migrant in the County. They can be seen briefly in late fall and early winter at certain locations like Sudbury Reservoir in Southborough, Wachusett Reservoir, Lake Quinsigamond and Quabbin Reservoir. Likewise, Greater White-fronted Goose seems to now be popping up in the County in fall and spring and sometimes even in mid-winter. One of the more likely explanations for this apparent increase in sightings of these species is the increase in the number of active birders. Simply put: more people in the field = more reports, especially of rarities.

The recent increase of reports of Fish Crows on the other hand likely represents an actual increase in the number of birds found in the County. This species is common at the southern end of the Blackstone National Corridor, especially in the vicinity of the Seekonk River between Providence and East Providence, Rhode Island where double digit counts are regular. Fish Crows are closely connected with water and do follow rivers up to find new territories to feed and eventually, breed. We still do not have proof of breeding in the County, but it is only a matter of time.

Despite starting out with a winter that we can all hope is never repeated, 2015 was another banner year for birds in Worcester County. Keep up the good work and get out there and bird!

- SNOW GOOSE (Anser caerulescens): All reports: Jan. 9 Westborough 4 (Larson fide <u>Bird Obs.</u>), Mar. 29 Bolton Flats 117 (Black, Brogan, Smoot), a single bird alternating from Bolton Flats and Dexter Drumlin from Apr. 4 (Lynch & Carroll, Marble) to Apr. 5 (v.o.). Then, Sept. 26 Barre Falls 1 (Schilling#), Oct. 17 Paxton 1 (Jenkins), and Dec. 14 Quaboag Pond 33 (Jenkins, Caron).
- GREATER WHITE-FRONTED GOOSE (A. albifrons): Three reports: Jan. 3 Worcester 1 (B. Kamp), a single bird Apr. 2 Lancaster (Lynch & Carroll) to Apr. 6 (v.o.), and in Holden a bird Dec. 19 (Bourinot) to Dec. 20 (Lynch & Carroll).
- **BRANT** (*Branta bernicla*): Two reports: May 19 Wachusett Res. 30 (Johnson) and Oct. 21 Wachusett Res. 1 (Lawson).
- **CANADA GOOSE** (*B. canadensis*): Permanent resident. Max. Apr. 2 Bolton Flats 1200 (Johnson) and Dec. 19 WoCC 2123.
- MUTE SWAN (Cygnus olor): Permanent resident. Max. Jan. 1 Westborough 57 (Lynch & Carroll) and Nov. 26 Westborough 121 (Lynch & Carroll).
- WOOD DUCK (Aix sponsa): Reported throughout the year, but only scattered reports during winter. In spring, beginning Mar. 12 West Boylston 3 (Lawson) most out by Nov. 28 Leesville Pond 5 (Kittredge). Max. Apr. 2 Bolton Flats 141 (Lynch & Carroll) and Oct. 18 Westborough WMA 80 (Young).
- BLUE-WINGED TEAL (Spatula discors): Apr. 19 Oxbow NWR 2 (Luedemann) to May 9 Bolton Flats 2 (Paulson). Then, Aug. 26 Bolton Flats 2 (B. Kamp) and Aug. 30 Holden 2 (Lynch & Carroll) to Nov. 2 West Brookfield 1 (Lawson), and a late Nov. 14 to the 20th Northborough 1 (Dowling). Max. Oct. 6 Sterling 5 (Lawson) and Oct. 19 East Brookfield 5 (Lawson).
- NORTHERN SHOVELER (S. clypeata): Three spring reports: One at Westborough WMA Apr. 7 (v.o.) to Apr. 17 (Spahr), Apr. 17 Broad Meadow Brook WS 2 (eBird), and Apr. 20 Wachusett Res. 2 (Lynch & Carroll). In fall, 2 reports: One at Quaboag Pond Sept. 10 (Lawson, Marble) to Sept. 24 1 (Jenkins) and Oct. 22 Westborough WMA 10 (v.o).

- GADWALL (*Mareca strepera*): Four reports of lingerers at various locations until Jan. 5 Millbury 8 (Lawson). Then, in spring Mar. 28 Worcester 2 (Lynch & Carroll), Apr. 4 and the next day at Wachusett Res. 2 (v.o.), Apr. 15 Bolton Flats 1 (Johnson), and also one there Apr. 26 (Paulson). Three fall reports: Oct. 30 West Brookfield 2 (Lawson), Nov. 6 Royalston 7 (Lynch & Carroll), and Dec. 21 to Dec. 24 West Brookfield 1 (Lynch & Carroll#).
- **AMERICAN WIGEON** (*M. americana*): Winter report Jan. 3 Millbury 1 (Lawson). Then, main spring period Mar. 26 Millbury 1 (Lawson) to Apr. 19 Wachusett Res. 2 (Johnson). In the fall, Sept. 11 Brookfield 1 (Jenkins), Oct. 9 Templeton 1 (Pirro) to Dec. 14 West Brookfield 1 (Lynch & Carroll). Max. Oct. 28 Leesville Pond 4 (Kittredge).
- MALLARD (Anas platyrhynchos): Permanent resident. First half max. Max. Jan. 3 Lake Quinsigamond 325 (Lynch & Carroll), and Mar. 15 Bolton Flats 400 (Paulson). Second half max. Nov. 13 Gardner 300 (Pirro), Dec. 14 SCC 724, Dec. 19 WoCC 1147, and Dec. 26 WeCC 803.
- **AMERICAN BLACK DUCK** (A. rubripes): Permanent resident, but only scattered reports during breeding season. First half max. Jan. 3 Lake Quinsigamond 62 (Lynch & Carroll) and Apr. 9 Bolton Flats 75 (Murray). Second half max. Dec. 14 SCC 37 and Dec. 19 WoCC 57.
- NORTHERN PINTAIL (A. acuta): Winter reports, up to 2 birds in Clinton Jan. 1 (Lynch & Carroll) to Jan. 3 (v.o) and Jan. 15 Northborough 3 (Miller). Then, Mar. 13 Charlton 1 (Young) to Apr. 15 Bolton Flats 3 (Johnson, Lawson). In the fall, Oct. 18 Charlton 1 to Dec. 24 West Brookfield 4 (Lynch & Carroll). Max. Apr. 11 Bolton Flats 10 (Keeley, Sullivan).
- GREEN-WINGED TEAL (A. crecca): Winter report: Jan. 7 Millbury 2 (B. Kamp). Then, Mar. 25 Sutton 2 and Millbury 1 (Lawson) to May 9 Oxbow NWR 2 (Paulson). In the fall, Aug. 19 Bolton Flats 2 (Bourget) and Sterling 1 (Bourget) to Dec. 24 West Brookfield 8 (Lynch & Carroll). Spring Max. Apr. 6 Lancaster 168 (Lynch & Carroll). Fall Max. Nov. 1 West Brookfield 42 (Lynch & Carroll).
- **CANVASBACK** (Aythya valisineria): One report: Nov. 15 Quaboag Pond 1 (Bourget, Lawson) where it stayed until the next day (Lawson).
- **REDHEAD** (A. americana): Two reports: Jan. 1 Southborough 2 (Lynch & Carroll, v.o.) to Jan. 2 (v.o.) and Jan. 2 Westborough WMA 2 (Paulson). Possibly the same birds.
- RING-NECKED DUCK (A. collaris): Five scattered first half winter reports with a max. Jan. 1 of 353 in Southborough (Lynch & Carroll). Returning in spring, Mar. 12 West Boylston 6 (Lawson) to May 16 Royalson 1 (C. Kamp). A summer report on July 21 Sutton 1 (Holden). There was an early report on Sept. 17 Wachusett Res. 2 (Robo). Then, a more normal Oct. 21 Brookfields 17 (Lynch & Carroll) to year's end. Spring max. Apr. 3 Brookfields 118 (Lynch & Carroll). Second half max. Nov. 15 Southborough 569 (Lynch & Carroll).
- GREATER SCAUP (A. marila): Two winter report locations: at Wachusett Res. Jan. 1, 55 (Lynch & Carroll), and Jan. 5, 65, also first half max., (Marble), decreasing to 4 on Jan. 10. The other winter location was Sudbury Reservoir in Southborough with up to 21 birds reported on Jan. 1 (Lynch & Carroll). In spring, Apr. 4 Wachusett Res. 1 (Lynch & Carroll) to Apr. 20 Wachusett Res. 3 (Lynch & Carroll). Returning Oct. 3 Clinton 2 (Johnson) to Dec. 19 WoCC 117, also second half max.
- **LESSER SCAUP** (A. affinis): Four first half winter reports: up to 2 birds at Wachusett Res. Jan. 1 (Lynch & Carroll) to Jan. 3 (Bourinot, Lawson), Jan. 1 Southborough 1 (Lynch & Carroll, Lawson), Jan. 3 Douglas 1 (Lynch & Carroll), and Feb. 17 Hubbardston 1 (Howes). In spring, only 2 reports: Apr. 10 West Boylston 2 (Shain) and Apr. 11 Brookfields 2 (Lynch & Carroll).

- In fall, returning Oct. 3 Northborough 1 (Spahr) to Dec. 19 Holden 2 (Bourinot). Max. Dec. 6 Southborough 6 (Dowling).
- **SURF SCOTER** (*Melanitta perspicillata*): Two reports: Oct. 10 Wachusett Res. up to 4 birds (Lynch & Carroll, Lawson, Monaco) and Oct. 26 Wachusett Res. 2 (Bourinot, Lawson, Marble).
- WHITE-WINGED SCOTER (M. fusca): Three spring reports: May 8 Wachusett Res. 2 (Bourinot), May 18 Gardner 3 (Pirro), and May 19 Wachusett Res. 2 (Johnson). Three reports in the fall: Oct. 8 Wachusett Res. 14, also max., (Johnson, Lawson), Oct. 10 Wachusett Res. 1 (Johnson, Lawson), Oct. 18 Wachusett Res. 4 (Bourinot), and Nov. 22 Wachusett Res. 1 (Lynch & Carroll).
- **BLACK SCOTER** (M. americana): Only in the fall, from Oct. 8 at Wachusett Res. 3 (Lawson) to Oct. 31 5 birds (Bourinot). Max. Oct. 18 with a flock of 96 there (Bourinot). Only other location reported was Nov. 23 Westminster 1 (Pirro).
- LONG-TAILED DUCK (Clangula hyemalis): A winter report of a single bird at Wachusett Res. from Jan. 1 (Lynch & Carroll, Paulson) to Jan. 3 (Bourinot). A spring report of one bird there from May 2 (Bourinot) to May 5 (Lawson). In the fall, Oct. 26 Wachusett Res. 38, also max., (Lawson). Then, seven interim reports. Last report Nov. 29 Wachusett Res. 3 (Dowling). Interim fall reports away from Wachusett were Nov. 10 Quaboag Pond 5 (Lawson), Nov. 11 Quaboag Pond 1 (Lawson), and Nov. 20 Lake Lashaway 1 (Dowling).
- BUFFLEHEAD (Bucephala albeola): Two winter reports: Jan. 1 Southborough 3 (Lynch & Carroll, Schlotterbeck) and Jan. 3 Wachusett Res. 2 (Bourinot). - **HOODED MERGANSER** (*Lophodytes cucullatus*): Present year round with open water. First half max. Jan. 3 Lake Quinsigamond 94 (Lynch & Carroll). Second half max. Nov. 19 Brookfields 118 (Lynch & Carroll), Dec. 14 SCC 130, and Dec. 19 WoCC 199.
- **COMMON MERGANSER** (Mergus merganser): First half through May 19 West Boylston 2 (Kittredge). Spring max. Apr. 11 Westborough WMA 90 (Spahr). Scattered breeding reports around Quabbin and northwestern Worcester County. In fall, Sept. 23 Princeton 1 (Cook) to year's end. Second half max. Nov. 19 Brookfields 661 (Lynch & Carroll), Dec. 14 SCC 462, and Dec. 30 Westborough WMA 430 (Paulson).
- **RED-BREASTED MERGANSER** (M. serrator): Two spring reports: up to 3 birds at Wachusett Res. from Apr. 19 (Johnson) to Apr. 21 (Lynch & Carroll), and May 3 Quabbin Res. 1 (Pirro). In fall, eight reports: Oct. 10 Wachusett Res. 1 (Lynch & Carroll) to Nov. 27 West Brookfield 3, also max., (Bergeron).

- RUDDY DUCK (Oxyura jamaicensis): Three winter reports: Jan. 1 to Jan. 3 Wachusett Res. 2 (Lynch & Carroll, B. Kamp), Southborough up to 3 (Lynch & Carroll, Schlotterbeck), and Jan. 22 Worcester 1 (Mulhearn). Three spring reports: Apr. 4 Wachusett Res. 3 (Lynch & Carroll), Apr. 17 Westborough WMA 3 (Lawson, Pulia, Spahr), and May 12 Westminster 1 (Pirro). In fall Oct. 7 Wachusett Res. 1 (Johnson) to Dec. 21 Brookfields 6 (Lynch & Carroll). Fall max. Nov. 5 Charlton 78 (Lawson), Nov. 17 Brookfields 85 (Lynch & Carroll), Nov. 14 West Brookfield 92 (Jenkins), and Dec. 14 SCC 155.
- RUFFED GROUSE (Bonasa umbellus): Permanent resident, but scarce reports away from Quabbin area and northwestern Worcester County. Max. Aug. 28 Hubbardston 6 (Howes). Also, June 7 Quabbin Res. 2 adults with 5 chicks (Holzapfel).
- WILD TURKEY (Meleagris gallopavo): Permanent resident. Max. Jan. 14 Templeton 110 (Small) and Dec. 19 ACC 336.
- PIED-BILLED GREBE (*Podilymbus podiceps*): In spring, Mar. 22 Lake Quinsigamond 1 (Kittredge, Lawson) to May 2 Bolton Flats 1 (B. Kamp). Possible breeding reports: May 22 and June 14 Bolton Flats 1 (Arena). In fall, Aug. 28 Westborough WMA 1 (Miller) to Dec. 19 WoCC 1. Max. Nov. 15 Westborough 4 (Lynch & Carroll. One bird spent the second half winter at Louisa Lake in Milford from Dec. 20 to the Dec. 31 (Gosselin, Paulson, Rosenblatt).
- **HORNED GREBE** (*Podiceps auritus*): In spring, only one report: Apr. 16 Westborough WMA 1 (Garvey, Lawson). In fall, Oct. 12 Wachusett Res. 3 (Lawson) to Dec. 5 Holden 1 (Lynch & Carroll). CW birds at Athol and WoCC on 12/19. Max. Nov. 9 Quabbin Res. 5 (Lynch & Carroll).
- **RED-NECKED GREBE** (*P. grisegena*): Two spring reports: Apr. 14 Westborough WMA (Garvey, Lawson, Spahr) and Apr. 30, reported from same location (Paulson). In fall, Oct. 8 Wachusett Res. (Lawson) to Nov. 9 Quabbin Res. 1 (Lynch & Carroll). A second half winter report Dec. 31 Upton 1 (Paulson).
- ROCK PIGEON (Columba livia): Permanent resident. Max. Nov. 14 Whittier Farm, Sutton 200 (Lynch & Carroll), Dec. 8 Templeton 200 (Pirro), and Dec. 19 WoCC 481.
- MOURNING DOVE (Zenaida macroura): Permanent resident. Max. Dec. 14 SCC 677.
- YELLOW-BILLED CUCKOO (Coccyzus americanus): May 10 Rice City Pond, Uxbridge 1 (Holden), Broad Meadow Brook WS, Worcester 3 (eBird) to Sept. 25 Hubbardston 1 (Howes). Max. May 10 Broad Meadow Brook WS, Worcester 3 (eBird) and June 8 Quabbin Res. Gate 43 3 (Paulson).

PASSERINE BANDING 2015 WEST HILL PARK, NORTHBRIDGE MA

West Hill Park-West Hill Dam is a 567-acre complex operated by the Army Corps of Engineers along the West River in Northbridge and Uxbridge. The habitat includes woodland, field and marsh, which supports a diversity of bird species. Since 2001, the banding program has documented 98 species of passerines at West Hill Park during spring and fall migration.

SPRING 2015

An extended period of cold weather delayed spring songbird banding at West Hill Park. Mist nets were opened on 8 mornings May 22-June 5, 2015. Total netted: 82 birds of 29 species, including recaptures. There was no significant influx of birds during this period; on several mornings, there was a maximum of 12 birds of 9 species.

Highlights. Banded birds included: Yellow-throated Vireo, Great Crested Flycatcher, Magnolia Warbler, Scarlet Tanager (first breeding plumaged male netted at this banding station), and male Rose-breasted Grosbeak. Recaptures (birds banded at West Hill Park in prior years) included a Warbling Vireo (in its 5th year of life or older); a male E. Towhee (in its 7th year or older); and a Prairie Warbler in at least its TENTH year of life.

FALL 2015

Passerines were banded on the mornings of September 25 and 26 following a long period of very warm, humid weather. 30 birds of 9 species were netted, including a Northern Waterthrush and a returning American Goldfinch (banded at the Park in spring 2014).

Saw-whet Owl Banding 2015 Lookout Rock, Northbridge, MA

Lookout Rock is a rocky elevation above the Blackstone River within the Blackstone River and Canal Heritage Park in Northbridge. The surrounding woods have been the site of a Northern Saw-whet Owl banding project since October 2003, in cooperation with Project Owlnet. These small owls pass through New England during October and November. The number of owls banded at the station varies considerably from year to year, ranging from 50 to 250.

Northern Saw-whet Owls were banded at Lookout Rock on 23 nights between October 14 and Nov 16, 2015. Warm temperatures, while a blessing for the banding team, probably were a factor in the small number of owls at the site this year--51 saw-whets were banded, and no owls banded at other stations were recaptured. The maximum number of owls per night was 6 on October 18 and November 2.

In comparison, last year's totals were 103 saw-whets banded plus 8 foreign recaptures.

A saw-whet banded at Lookout Rock in November of last year was netted at Drumlin Farm in Lincoln this season.
